Once again we are proud to share news with our community about the educational experiences offered at Nicolet as well as the achievements of our students and faculty.

Over the past several months, we have engaged the community in a conversation about our shared commitment to maintaining educational excellence at Nicolet. As a result the school board has taken several steps to ensure that the District is poised to continue on this path into the future.

On January 25, the school board extended contracts for the District's leadership team through the 2017-2018 school year. This consistency will allow us to continue implementation of our strategic plan that supports student achievement at Nicolet.

Based on community feedback gathered in November, the school board unanimously approved placing an operational referendum question on the April 5 ballot asking taxpayers for permission to increase our state revenue limit by an additional \$3.15 million per year for each of the next six school years (2016-2017 through 2021-2022). These operational funds will be used to maintain and support instructional programs, services and class sizes at Nicolet.

To ensure voters can make an informed decision this spring, we have included information about the referendum in this newsletter (please see pages 4-5). Additionally, the District will hold open house style informational sessions to answer your questions about the referendum on Wednesday, March 16 (6:30 – 8 p.m.) and Saturday, March 19 (9 – 10:30 a.m.). I encourage you to attend one of the meetings as your schedule allows.

The Foundation thanks all who contributed to the Annual Appeal. We raised nearly \$15,000 to enrich the Nicolet learning experience.



Junior Maria Graziano won the Wisconsin Association of Foreign Language Teachers 2016 Lynn Bolton Student Travel Scholarship.


Congratulations to the following students who received a Gold Key in the 2016 Scholastic Writing Awards:

APRIL 5 REFERENDUM

WHAT IS ON THE BALLOT TUESDAY APRIL 5, 2016?

The Nicolet High School District's School Board has unanimously approved placing an operational referendum question on the April 5 ballot asking taxpayers for permission to increase our state revenue limit by an additional \$3.15 million per year for each of the next six school years (2016-2017 through 2021-2022) to maintain and support instructional programs, services and class sizes at Nicolet.

The formal resolution requesting permission to exceed the state revenue limit will appear as follows on the April 5, 2016 ballot:

THE STATE OF WISCONSIN SETS A LIMIT ON THE AMOUNT OF MONEY, PER Student, that school districts can receive each year through Property taxes. An operational referendum requests Permission from voters to exceed this amount.

AN ADDITIONAL \$7 PER YEAR FOR EVERY \$100,000 OF A HOME'S VALUE

Shall the Nicolet Unified High School District, Milwaukee and Ozaukee Counties, Wisconsin be authorized to **exceed the revenue limit** specified in Section 121.91, Wisconsin Statutes, by **\$3.15 million per year** for **non-recurring purposes** for the 2016-2017 school year through the 2021-2022 school year, in order to **maintain and support** instructional programs, services, and class sizes?

THE REFERENDUM, IF APPROVED, WILL END AFTER Six years. It will not continue indefinitely. IF APPROVED, THE REFERENDUM FUNDS WILL BE USED SPECIFICALLY TO MAINTAIN CLASS SIZES, Current course offerings and programs Rather than make budget reductions.

WHAT WILL THE REFERENDUM COST?

If approved, homeowners would pay an additional \$7 per year for every \$100,000 of their home's value for six years.

WHY ARE WE PROPOSING THIS REFERENDUM NOW?

- Our current operational referendum (approved in 2011) is expiring and without a replacement referendum, the district is facing a budget shortfall averaging \$3.15 million per year each of the next six years.
- We must continue to maintain and protect instructional programs, services and class sizes to support student achievement for every student, in every classroom, every day.
- We are responding directly to community input provided this fall by more than 2,150 residents, with the majority supporting an operational referendum for \$3.15 million per year for six years.



MAKE AN INFORMED DECISION

WHAT HAPPENS IF THE REFERENDUM FAILS?

If the referendum is not approved, the district will need to make approximately \$2.1 million in immediate budget cuts and use an estimated \$800,000 of the district's fund balance (operating reserves) for the 2016-2017 school year. We estimate an ADDITIONAL \$925,000 in budget cuts would also be required for the 2017-2018 school year, before leveling off to approximately \$175,000 to \$275,000 of reductions per year thereafter.

WHAT ACTIONS HAS THE DISTRICT ALREADY TAKEN TO REDUCE COSTS?

When facing budget reductions in the past, the district has made difficult decisions to reduce operating expenses in order to maintain a balanced budget. Some past cost saving measures include:

- Reducing full-time teaching staff
- Decreasing instructional support services such as guidance counselors, social workers and classroom aides
- · Eliminating course offerings, including two world languages
- · Combining the athletic and recreation department staff and services into one office
- Reorganizing administrative positions and duties
- Shifting resources away from the classroom to support required utilities, transportation and other non-educational expenses

WHAT ADDITIONAL CUTS WOULD THE DISTRICT NEED TO MAKE IF THE REFERENDUM FAILS?

Without renewing the operational referendum that is expiring, the district is faced with making reductions of 15% across all departments. The district would need to close the budget gap(s) by making potential cuts such as:

- · Reducing teachers and support staff, resulting in increased class sizes
- Reducing the variety of courses taught at Nicolet and offering fewer sections of each class
- Reducing funding for music, theatre and art programs, which could mean fewer performances and shows
- Reducing funding for athletics, which could result in the elimination of



urricular programs, such as FEAR robotics, forensics, ography and Model UN ng for instructional technology



Ski Team: The Boys and Girls Ski teams both qualified for the Ski State Championships. Boys State team members are Charlie Dickson, Charlie Rosmann, Harry Rosmann, Jake Tarnowski, Grant Siverhus, Filip Selvik and Sam Wiegers (alternate). Girls State team members include Elizabeth Jaekels, Sydney Smith, Gabi Marcus, Maddie Wallace and Abby Schill (alternate).

Boys Hockey: The Boys are led by Nico Aguilar, Zach Asmann, George Sullivan, Ethan Long, Conner Aguilar and Kyle Asmann.

Boys Basketball: The Boys basketball team is led by seniors Tyree Young, Raylonzo Woods and Jezzriah Burton, who are the top scorers. **Girls Hockey:** The Girls Hockey team is conference champions for the second consecutive year. The Girls finished 8-0-1 in Eastern Shores Conference games. Junior Nicole Unsworth earned 1st Team All-Conference and Freshman Marie Dedert earned Honorable Mention All-Conference.





NICOLET HIRES VARSITY FOOTBALL COACH
